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Fred Smith of Michigan to Receive NIAAA Professional Development Award

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (November 20, 2012) — **Fred Smith**, CMAA, athletic administrator of the Buchanan (Michigan) Community Schools, is the 2012 recipient of the Frank Kovaleski Professional Development Award presented by the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NIAAA).

Smith will receive his award December 18 in San Antonio, Texas, during banquet festivities at the 43rd annual National Athletic Directors Conference conducted jointly by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) and the NIAAA.

The Frank Kovaleski Professional Development Award is presented each year to an NIAAA member who possesses and has contributed to the vision of professional development - the legacy of Frank Kovaleski - and who has made significant

contributions and demonstrated excellence in professional development at the local, state and national levels. Kovaleski was director of the NIAAA, as well as assistant director of the NFHS, from 1989 until his retirement in 2005. He was responsible for starting the NIAAA Leadership Training Program in 1996 and expanding the NIAAA Certification Program in 1999.

A teacher, coach and administrator in Michigan for 32 years, Smith has distinguished himself as a local, state and national leader in high school athletics. He has directed the athletic programs for the Buchanan schools for the past six years after 16 years in a similar capacity with the Comstock Public Schools in Kalamazoo, Michigan. Prior to his duties in Kalamazoo, Smith was a teacher, coach and athletic administrator at Lake Michigan Catholic Junior/Senior High School in St. Joseph, Michigan.

As an athletic administrator, Smith has been active in expanding sport offerings and promoting the value of educational athletics. He has expanded awards programs to include recognition of tri-athletes (students who participate in least one sport per season) and four-year participants. Smith has worked with parents to develop active all-sport athletic booster organizations while increasing fundraising efforts through a variety of events.

In other accomplishments at the local level, Smith has hosted student leadership conferences and provided funding and encouragement for coaches to attend state coaching clinics, as well as the Michigan High School Athletic Association Coaches Advancement Program. He has hosted league tournaments in numerous sports and served as conference commissioner for cross country and track and field.

At the state level, Smith served on the Michigan Interscholastic Athletic

Administrators Association (MIAAA) Executive Board from 1993 to 1998, including a

term as president in 1996-97. The chair of the MIAAA Professional Development Committee, Smith helped develop the MIAAA Leadership Academy for young athletic administrators and was facilitator for the MIAAA's second Strategic Plan. Smith also is a state instructor for the NIAAA's Leadership Training Institute (LTI).

In addition, Smith has been active in the Michigan High School Athletic

Association (MHSAA). He has been a member of the Representative Council since 2004, and has served as manager for regional and district tournaments in various sports.

Smith has assisted the MHSAA with 11 State Track and Field Championships and three State Individual Wrestling Championships. He has been a presenter for the new athletic director in–service program and has been an instructor for the MHSAA's Coaching Certification Program.

As a national LTI instructor, Smith has directed leadership classes in eight states and at numerous national conferences. Currently the national chair for Leadership Training Course (LTC) 501, Smith was on the development committee for LTC 720. Smith was a member of the NIAAA Credentials Committee from 1989 to 1995, and the Board of Directors from 1997 to 1999. He currently serves on the NIAAA Hall of Fame Committee.

Smith's career achievements include numerous awards for his service to athletics. In 1997, Smith was named MIAAA Regional Athletic Director of the Year, followed by an NIAAA Commendation Award in 1999, MIAAA State Athletic Director of the Year in 2000 and induction into the Battle Creek St. Philip Athletic Hall of Fame that same year. Also in 2000, Smith received the NIAAA Distinguished Service Award, and Midwest Athletic Director of the Year awards from both the National Council of Secondary School Athletic Directors and the National High School Athletic Coaches Association. In 2004, Smith received the NIAAA Thomas E. Frederick Award of

Excellence, and in 2007, he was the recipient of the MIAAA George Lovich State Award of Merit.
